2 YEAR LONGITUDINAL STUDY ON THE IMPACT OF PARENTAL ENGAGEMENT ON IMPROVED STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

The Family School and Community Partnerships Bureau is conducting a study to identify and validate indicators and measures for evaluating and monitoring the success of parental engagement activity within schools and across regions and jurisdictions.

The 2 year longitudinal study on the impact of parental engagement on improved student learning outcomes will build on previous work commissioned through the Australian Research Alliance for Children and Youth (ARACY) that continues to demonstrate the relationship between parental engagement and improved student learning outcomes and has sourced the expertise of a selection of schools and community groups across the Nation to take part in the study as identified by the Bureau Research Advisory Group.

The intended purpose for the findings of such a study is to use the results to improve learning opportunities and outcomes for students by informing the development and refinement of parental engagement resources and the framework, to better serve the needs of teachers, students, parents, communities, and school leaders in the area of parental engagement. The schools and organisations participating include: Coodanup Community College, Western Australia, Glenroy College, Victoria, Killester College, Victoria, Sackville Street PS, New South Wales, Holy Cross College, New South Wales, Maningrida College, Northern Territory, 100 Story Building, Victoria

FRAMEWORK REFINEMENT PROJECT

The Family-School Partnerships Framework has been available for use in schools for 5 years and has never had a comprehensive evaluation or update. In light of Education reforms, it is timely that the Bureau ensures that the Framework maintains currency, relevance and is easily accessible and familiar to schools families and community organisations. The project consists of gathering the opinions of Educators, parents and community members on how we can better the framework; improve schools, families and communities knowledge of the existence of the framework; and make the framework more accessible to schools, families and communities. Consultations have commenced and are continuing into the near future with some great ideas being gathered.

Focus group participants include the Public and Independent Sector affiliates and networks, Partnership Brokers and Individual unaffiliated schools and families, consultations are also in the initial stages with affiliates of the Catholic Education sector. The States represented are Queensland, Victoria, Tasmania, Western Australia, South Australia, Australian Capital Territory and New South Wales. The Bureau would like to acknowledge the dedicated work that participating organisations have conducted in preparation for these groups; your support has been invaluable. 
"We loved that we were able to have the opportunity to contribute to such a worthwhile project".


"It would be great to see a living document that is reflective of Family, schools' and community needs".

ROUNDTABLE

The Two Day National Parental Engagement Roundtable was held on 16-17 September 2013 in, Canberra.

The Project brought together 40 participants with representatives from the Department of Education, Employment and Workplace Relations (DEEWR) representatives from jurisdictions including seven school teams throughout Australia which included the Principal or nominated representative, teacher and parent representative nominated by the Bureau Research Advisory Group.

The primary goal of the roundtable was to provide a national perspective to inform and support the direction of the development of parental engagement resources, refinement of the framework, including the identification of existing resources for parental engagement which will be added to the existing list of resources on the Bureau website.
